
Is it not possible that an individual may be right and the government wrong?

It's been said that the road to hell is paved with good intentions. The Real ID act and the regulations there under promulgated by Homeland Security and the technology provided by L1 Identity Solutions could very well be taking us down that road. Former and/or current members of L1 Identity Solutions include former FBI director Louis Freeh, former Homeland Security Deputy ADM James Loy, and former CIA Director Robert LaPenta.

The below chart shows L1 Identity Solutions' vision of their biometric technology which is embedded in the Real ID Act of 2005. PennDOT is capturing biometric data from driver license pictures without our consent.



Notice that their vision is to initially use biometric data for law enforcement. It ends with "Point of Sale."

In Oklahoma, not only does the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) use facial recognition software to convert one's facial image into biometric data, which PennDOT is doing, but their DMV also requires fingerprints of their drivers.

The book of Revelation is John's record of what God's angel showed him while he was on the island of Patmos.

In Chapter 13, verses 16 and 17, John writes about a beast, "And he made all, both small and great, rich and poor, free and bond, to receive a mark in their right hand or in their foreheads. And that no man might buy or sell, save he that had the mark, or the name of the beast, or the number of his name."
